First Reading Jonah 3:1-5, 10 see insert In our Hebrew scripture lesson the prophet Jonah, following his ordeal in the belly of a great fish, receives a second summons to prophesy to the heather city of Ninevah. Jonah preaches as he passed into the city, proclaiming repentance and predicting forty days before the city's overthrow. The people of Ninevah believe God and respond to the prophet's message, proclaiming a fast and putting on the sackcloth and ashes that signify mourning and repentance. In response to Ninevah's turn of heart, God determines not to destroy the city.

Second Reading Corinthians 7:29-31 see insert In this lesson we hear that Paul is disturbed by the news of fractions in the young Corinthian church. They must instead be unified in Jesus, in whose name alone they are baptized. Paul is grateful on this account that he himself has baptized very few of them, and that he does not preach with such eloquent wisdom that people would rely on him rather than the cross of Christ.


